<u>Daily Devotions for Home and Family</u> For the Week of The Fourth Sunday of Easter April 21 through April 27

VIII. THE PERSON OF CHRIST

⁶⁹ In this way no distinction would be made between Christ according to his human nature and other holy people, and thus Christ would be robbed of his majesty, which as a human being and according to his human nature he has received above all creatures.

⁷⁰ For no other creature, whether man or angel, can or should say, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me" (Matt. 28:18). For while it is true that God, together with the whole fullness of deity which he always has with him, dwells in believers, he does not do so bodily nor is he personally united with them as in the case of Christ. It is because of the personal union that Christ says, also according to the human nature, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me" (Matt. 28:18); likewise, when Jesus knew that "the Father had given all things into his hands" (John 13:3); likewise, "In him dwells the whole fullness of deity bodily" (Col. 2:9); likewise, "Thou has crowned him with glory and honor and didst set him over the works of thy hands, putting everything in subjection under his feet. Now in putting everything in subjection to him, he left nothing outside his control" (Heb. 2:7, 8), and "he is excepted who put all things under him" (1 Cor. 15:27).

⁷¹ We do not in any way believe, teach, and confess an outpouring of the majesty of God and all its properties into the human nature of Christ of such a kind that thereby the divine nature is weakened or surrenders to another something that belongs to it without keeping it for itself. Nor do we believe that in its substance and essence the human nature allegedly received equal majesty, separated or divided from the nature and essence of the Son of God, as when water, wine, or oil is poured from one container into another. For the human nature, like every other creature in heaven or on earth, is not capable of the omnipotence of God in such a way that it would become an omnipotent essence intrinsically or have omnipotent properties intrinsically. Thereby Christ's human nature would be denied and completely transformed into the Godhead. This is contrary to our Christian Creed and to the entire prophetic and apostolic doctrine. ⁷² But we believe, teach, and confess that God the Father gave his Spirit to Christ, his beloved Son, according to the assumed human nature (whence he is called Messiah, or the Anointed) in such a way that he received the Spirit's gifts not by measure, like other saints. The "Spirit of wisdom and understanding, of counsel and might and knowledge" (Isa. 11:2; 61:1) does not rest upon Christ the Lord according to his assumed human nature (according to the deity he is of one essence with the Holy Spirit)⁷³ in such a manner that as a man he therefore knows and can do only certain things in the way in which other saints know and can do things through the Holy Spirit who endows them only with created gifts. Rather, since Christ according to the Godhead is the second person in the holy Trinity and the Holy Spirit proceeds from him as well as from the Father (and therefore he is and remains to all eternity his and the Father's own Spirit, who is never separated from the Son), it follows that through personal union the entire fullness of the Spirit (as the ancient Fathers say) is communicated to Christ according to the flesh that is personally united with the Son of God. ⁷⁴ This fullness demonstrates and manifests itself spontaneously and with all power in, with, and through the human nature. The result is not that he knows only certain things and does not know certain other things, or that he can do certain things and cannot do certain other things, but that he knows and can do everything. The Father poured out upon him without measure the Spirit of wisdom and power, so that as a man, through the personal union, he really and truly has received all knowledge and all power. In this way all the treasures of wisdom are hid in him, all authority is given to him,³ and he is exalted to the right hand of the majesty and power of God. ~ FC, SD VIII:69-74
