For this is the message that you have heard from the beginning, that we should love one another. By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers (1 John 3:11, 16).

February is a month that often turns our hearts toward the concept of love as we prepare to observe Valentine's Day. Emotionally driven cards and beautiful candy adorn the shelves at the stores, restaurants are advertising Valentine's Day dinner specials, and the pressure is on for husbands and boyfriends to do something nice for their spouse or significant other. This is not meant to belittle this day at all. It is very good for us to offer up expressions of love to those around us, even as Paul himself suggested that the greatest thing we have in this world and the next is love (1 Corinthians 13:13).

As Valentine's Day comes and goes, however, so often do the expressions of love highlighted on this day. Red colors in stores quickly turn to green, nice dinners make way for corned beef and green beer, flowers given begin to fade and the heart-shaped candy starts to make room for egg-shaped ones. Perhaps this is because we don't fully consider what love really is, or don't always give it what is due for this powerful, and necessary gift that we have been given.

More than just shallow sentimentality, love is much deeper. It is not merely emotive, but is a deep and abiding care for another. Love looks out for the good of the other above the self, and love is sacrificial in many ways. As John suggests above, if we want to know what love is we need look no further than to the cross of Christ where love was, and is, on display for the whole world to see as Jesus lays down his life for us. There, the red of Valentine's cards is revealed in the blood shed for us to cleanse us of our sins. There we see a love so deep that it endured suffering and death to make sure that we were reconciled to God. There, in a strange way, we see the victory of Christ over sin, death, and the devil, and by his resurrection, we have life eternal in his name. Such precious gifts are things that do not come and go with a day or a season, but are our dearest treasures every day of our life here on earth until we are brought into the glory of the kingdom eternally.

February also brings us, this year, to the season of Lent, a time where we focus intently on the love of God for us sinners. It is a time of repentance, and it is a time of renewal for God's people as we keep our eyes ever fixed upon the cross of Christ and the salvation that he won for us. Take advantage of the opportunities to mark this blessed season, beginning with Ash Wednesday on February 18. Make use of the extra services during the week, and use them as a means to prepare for that holiest of weeks where our Lord accomplishes our salvation through the cross and the empty tomb. This way we may come to Easter with joyful hearts, knowing the fulness of the love of God made known to us in Christ. He laid down his life for us so that we might live with him in his love for all eternity. Happy Valentine's Day, and have a blessed Lententide!

With the return of *Coffee Hour*, there is more feedback about the hymns we sing. “Good hymns this morning”, “people really sang out on *that* one”, or sometimes, “that was really a doozy!” - thankfully, not heard too often!

What constitutes a “good hymn”? I’m currently serving on a panel for a hymn competition. The competition allows for submissions of a text, tune or a combination of both, intended for assembly song. The panel began by each finding our own guidelines along with our top 8-10 “best contenders” amidst the entries. Coming together for discussion, we shared and sought consensus on our guidelines and determined some points of agreement on the submissions. Next we were tasked to reconsider all of the submissions in light of our discussion to see what we might have missed previously.

For many, a “good hymn” is one that they know. It often has an emotional connection to a person, place or event. I dare say the connection of the hymn to an individual’s faith often comes further down the list, but over time, moves up as it is recalled and gives voice to praise, prayers, and the comfort God’s Word & teaching, set poetically, provides.

Among Lutherans, text is critical. Martin Luther wrote and used hymns for theological instruction. Hymn singing was a good and unifying way to involve congregants in worship and to implant God’s Word and teachings in minds and, by the Holy Spirit, in hearts, as well. Connecting a text and tune increases memorability as each helps to recall the other.

A good hymn will “sing well” – not necessarily immediately, though that is a plus. What is the tune’s “shape”? Does it go anywhere, melodically and /or harmonically? Does it return “home” (or does it need to)? Are the tessitura and vocal range ones that a congregation can negotiate? Can people sing the rhythm and phrases as “one voice”, unifying the breath of the ensemble?

Do the text and tune work together? Hymn texts are most often poetic with a structured meter, but even with that structure, strong and weak syllables and beats need to align to enable a natural flow when sung. Those on the panel who are students of prose and poetry, challenged texts in ways that enlightened the reading of them, even as they were tempted to do so with red pencil in hand to “make corrections”; truth be told, I did the same, often from a musical perspective. There were cultural challenges to some submissions. There were theological challenges.

There was a conversation stopping (meant to shock/playing devil’s advocate?) statement that one individual didn’t believe we needed any new hymns; that we had plenty of good ones gathered over more than two millennia which already numbered many more that we could actually sing in our lifetime.

I had pondered the need for more settings of the “ordinary” (Kyrie, Gloria, Sanctus, Agnus, etc.). Did the submissions bring something to the table justifying the displacement of music already known, readily available and written on peoples’ hearts? New settings can refresh the Divine Service, but would these do so? We rejected the challenge to forego all new music. I believe we can benefit from well-crafted, theologically sound and relevant, insightful new texts coupled with tunes that bring a fresh voice today, not to reject that which has stood the test of time, but to enhance the body of the church’s hymnody with the best offerings of the gifts today’s poets and musicians have to offer.

I’m hopeful that within the next year, we might have the opportunity to sing that which is determined to be the winning entry. I hope that there might be opportunity to share some of the others, as well, as they deserve to be heard. Judging to find a “winner” is not an easy task, but the honing of discernment that is required is a good exercise – one we might all glean from as we take in or seek to make art and music in its many forms; to find and engage with that which nourishes and feeds our souls! Choose wisely, choose prayerfully and intentionally – and enjoy the feast that awaits!

Coming up – March 7 is the LCMS Atlantic District Festival of Workshops. This year Rex Holden and St. John's Eagle Eye Ringers will present a workshop that is one of many practical, interesting and potentially useful offerings you can attend that day at the (beautiful!) SUNY Maritime College. Meet, greet, converse, listen to, and eat with others to find out what people within our church's District are doing!

Advanced notice: mark your calendars for Sunday, April 19 at 3pm when the Long Island Brass Guild returns to St. John's for our annual fundraising program for ***Mercy Haven, Inc.*** - serving the less fortunate in our communities. We'll welcome several new players who have replaced those who have retired as the Guild continues to evolve. Underway is the writing of some new arrangements of works that will be premiered that afternoon for brass & organ! Plan to join us and invite a friend or neighbor, too!

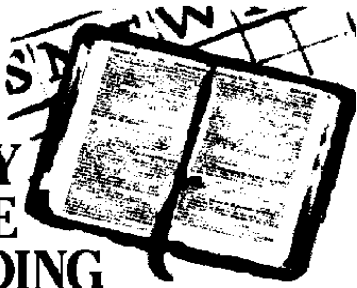
