And the LORD said to Moses, ¹³ "You are to speak to the people of Israel and say, 'Above all you shall keep my Sabbaths, for this is a sign between me and you throughout your generations, that you may know that I, the LORD, sanctify you. ¹⁴ You shall keep the Sabbath, because it is holy for you. Everyone who profanes it shall be put to death. Whoever does any work on it, that soul shall be cut off from among his people. ¹⁵ Six days shall work be done, but the seventh day is a Sabbath of solemn rest, holy to the LORD. Whoever does any work on the Sabbath day shall be put to death. ¹⁶ Therefore the people of Israel shall keep the Sabbath, observing the Sabbath throughout their generations, as a covenant forever. ¹⁷ It is a sign forever between me and the people of Israel that in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day he rested and was refreshed." ~ Exodus 31:12-17

Did you catch that? The "penalty" for failing to observe the Sabbath was to have one's soul cut off from the people, and death. That seems pretty severe to our modern ears. Granted, the children of Israel likely didn't have lacrosse games or dance recitals, and stores definitely weren't open on Sabbath days at that time, but death for missing out on a Sabbath? That's harsh on God's part.

However, the severity of the punishment was not meant to be frightening, but rather to highlight the importance of Sabbath observance. It is something so important, so beneficial – so restful and refreshing – that missing it was really a matter of life and death. On the Sabbath, God's people heard the Scriptures, prayed together, and sang psalms and spiritual songs. Eventually, there was the sacrifice that took place to remove the sin of the people. It was a day of rest, for the manna and quail did not need to be gathered. It was about stopping life for a moment, receiving God's goodness, and finding grace.

Today's Sabbath observances are the same for God's people, even if the "penalty" for missing a Sunday service is not as severe-seeming. Each Sunday, there is Absolution for our sin, God's Word for our ears and heart to guide us in the way of Jesus, and there is heavenly food given at the Lord's Table. While some might think skipping out in favor of other activities isn't too big a deal, or that summer is time off from everything, the truth is that apart from Christ on the Sabbath, it is a matter of life and death. Being absent too long is detrimental to the soul and it can lead to eternal death.

Time for a rather frank conversation, if I may. It is with words like these in mind that I have an ongoing inner debate ongoing. The reality is that today's world is not like ancient Israel in the wilderness, and for some, Sunday worship is not a possibility. Thus, should we as a congregation be sensitive to that reality and provide other alternatives? However, we are also a people who make regular commitments to things all the time – practices and rehearsals, community and committee meetings, other social obligations, etc. If something comes up to do in those times, we are more likely than not to say, "I can't, I already have" such and such. Yet when something comes up on Sunday morning, it is easier to say "yes" to it and try to catch church next week, or another time. Some have suggested that maybe our service times are not ideal, but not unlike visiting a doctor or seeing a movie, we don't always have the option of convenience, but must work our life around what is offered. In that regard, if Sabbath observance is a matter of life and death, why would we not want to

just block off the time to be at church on Sunday, and work the rest of the day around it? Such is the debate I have had in my mind, and have discussed with Elders on occasion.

But, I'd also like to know what you think, and I am asking honestly. If Sunday morning just could not happen for you or your family, is there another day or time that might work? If there were another option, would you utilize it (really)? In other words, if you say you'd come at a different time if Sunday didn't work, would you and your family really avail yourselves of the opportunity, or are you merely saying theoretically you would?

To give you a voice in this, a brief survey will be made available in church and online (you can access the <u>survey here</u>), seeking your feedback on this topic. Bear in mind that the Elders and I are merely exploring the possibility of this to see if there is interest, and are not guaranteeing that another opportunity will be offered, or given at one of the times you may suggest. At this point, it is a matter of determining need and weighing it against whether it might negatively impact Sunday mornings. Please take a look at the survey, and fill it out as we seek to meet the needs of our church community here in Sayville and beyond.

We are doing this because the Sabbath is important. It is good for our soul to gather in the presence of Christ and to be fed and nourished by him. And, it is good for the body of the Christ, the community of faith, to be together, and to share our life around Christ and his divine life. Such is what strengthens us for life in this world, and what gives us eternal hope of the life we shall have in God's kingdom forever.

Accessibility at Saint John's

Did you know that Saint John's is fully accessible for those who have mobility issues? Our church certainly has a lot of steps to get into it from the front doors, and at times there are folks who have a really hard time making it. But, in fact, we have an elevator that can lead you right into the sanctuary!

Over time, people have not wanted to utilize the elevator due to pride in being able to tackle the stairs, or fear that they might get stuck in it, or shame that they are sitting "up front". However, there is no shame in needing an easier way in to church so you are not exhausted by the time you sit down, or worse, fall on your way in! Also, our elevator is inspected twice a year to make sure it is functioning properly, so all the horror stories you've heard in the past have been eliminated. And lastly, there is no need to feel strange sitting up in the front. In fact, if two steps up and down are easier than all the steps in the front, then you can still sit in the pews. But even when sitting in the front now, you are more or less hidden from view of the folks sitting the pews. And besides, what does it matter? You are coming to hear the Word and receive the Supper. Sitting up front gets you right in the action and makes you the closest one to what is taking place!

For those who are not aware of how our elevator works, here are some pictures to make you familiar:



You can park by the gym entrance and utilize the ramp to get into the building.

Once in the gym, look for the elevator door next to the stage.





Open both the outer door, and the inner accordion door, then head on in for a smooth ride!

This will bring you to the sanctuary level where you can sit up near where the service assistants sit. You still have a great view of everything that's happening!





As you can see, people in the pews really can't see you, so there's no need to feel like you "on display". So please use this as needed, or know that it is available for family or friends you may bring with you to church. Our ushers are happy to help if you need assistance!
