On the last weekend in November, we closed out the Church Year by hearing Jesus' admonition to "Stay awake." We were reminded that the Last Day is coming, but we do not know when, and so until that Day comes, we should stay awake and be ready for its coming. Now we enter the season of Advent and a new Church Year, and one of the watchwords of these days is "wait." We are waiting for the coming of the Messiah on Christmas, for his arrival on our altar at the Lord's Supper each time we gather, and for his coming in glory on that Last Day.

Stay awake. Watch. Wait. These are words that are hard for any of us. Asking kids to wait, however, at this time of year, is even more difficult. Yet this is precisely what the Church does throughout the days of Advent, in contrast to the world.

I ran across this quote the other day, which seemed very appropriate for us. Jospeh Bottum writes: "Christmas has devoured Advent, gobbled it up with the turkey giblets and the goblets of seasonal ale. Every secularized holiday, of course, tends to lose the context it had in the liturgical year. Across the nation, even in many churches, Easter has hopped across Lent, Halloween has frightened away All Saints', and New Year's has drunk up Epiphany...Through all the preparatory readings of Advent, through all the genealogical Jesse trees, the somber candles on the wreaths, the vigils, and the hymns, Advent keeps Christmas on Christmas Day: a fulfillment, a perfection, of what had gone before. 'I shall see him, but not now; I shall behold him, but not nigh.'"

Many have lamented the fact that Christmas has come so early this year. Stores dismissed Halloween by September in favor of it; Hallmark has had its movies running for weeks already; musak in the stores has subtly made the switch for some time already; and, it wouldn't surprise me if by mid-December, Christmas will have already given way to Valentine's Day. As a people, we are in a rush to move on to the next thing, and in many ways, a holiday like Thanksgiving barely gets a notice with the exception that there's extra football games on and somebody's doing a lot of cooking. It makes one wonder: what is the rush?

That is why Advent is such an important time in the Church Year. While even well-meaning Christians are ready for Christmas hymns come December, we wait. We shall behold the Christ, but not now. Now, we wait. We pray. We hear again the promises. We sing the hymns of preparation. We live in this tension of anticipation and expectation, and our temptation is to accelerate toward Advent's culmination. But we don't. We wait. As the Psalmist says, we, like watchmen wait for the day to come when the Savior is born, and until then, we hold on in hope to every word that comes from his mouth.

Because Christmas "stuff" starts making an appearance in September, and because Christmas songs start so soon, it is no wonder why Christmas trees often make their way to the curb Christmas night, and other decorations and lights come down so soon after. Christmas is a joyous 12-day season to celebrate the birth of Savior and the fulfillment of God's promises. And dare I say, it is the waiting in Advent that helps make the joy last beyond December 26. There are a lot of things happening at St. John's in the season of Advent to help you

in the waiting. So, I cordially invite you to come and be part of it. Bring others with you. Slow down the "season" and bring your focus upon the coming One who loves you enough to be born in the flesh for you, to die for your sins and misdeeds, and who rises again to bring you to the light of heaven and to his "plentiful redemption." "Joy to the World" is coming...but not yet. For now we sing "Come, Thou Precious Ransom, Come" and "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus" and we wait, eagerly, for "redemption's happy dawn" to arrive. A blessed Advent to you!

Come, Thou precious Ransom, come,
Only hope for sinful mortals!
Come, O Savior of the world!
Open are to Thee all portals.
Come, Thy beauty let us see;
Anxiously we wait for Thee. (LSB 578, st. 3)!

<u>Advent Midweek Services</u> – On *Wednesdays, December 4, 11, & 18* we will once again hold our midweek Advent services at *noon & 7pm*. Our theme this year is centered around Philippians 4:4-5, especially on the word "Rejoice" as we anticipate the cause for all rejoicing: the coming of our Lord and Savior. Please join us each week!

<u>Longest Night</u> – We will also once again hold our Longest Night service on *Saturday, December 21 at 7pm*. This service gives voice to the reality that, even in this joyous season, for some it is difficult as they deal with loss or pain. And yet, there is always hope in the Light of the World, Jesus Christ. <u>Faith Renewal</u> – If you are interested in learning, or refreshing your memory, on the basics of the Lutheran, Christian faith, please join us for the Faith Renewal Class beginning **December 8**th at **11:00am**. We will meet on subsequent Sundays (taking breaks over Christmas/New Year's) for about an hour each session. This class is also designed for those who are considering membership at St. John's. A signup sheet has been posted for those who are interested in attending. New or experienced to Lutheranism, all are welcome!

<u>First Communion</u> – Classes for 6th grade students desiring to receive First Communion in 2025 will begin on *Tuesday, January 14 at 6pm*. <u>Mary Martha</u> – We thank all of you who donated the stuffed animals for Angela's House. We also thank Thrivent Financial for giving us the \$250 to purchase additional stuffed animals. We were able to deliver about 75 stuffed animals to Angela's house. When delivering shoeboxes to the Gospel Community Church on Greeley Avenue, they heard about what we were doing and donated a huge bag of stuffed animals to add to what we were already bringing to Angela's House. So again, we thank you and them for these blessings.



Today (11/26) was "Day Zero" – the point at which there was no turning back. For the past 6 days, my husband's brother Arthur has had intense chemotherapy; heavy radiation was added today to complete the destruction of leukemia laced stem cells in his body. For two days he waits, and then stem cells from a matched donor will be introduced, finding residence in his bones and, Lord willing, the transplanted cells will "rescue" his bone marrow and start to produce new, healthy blood cells.

The medical staff actually counts minus day 6, minus day 5, etc. until reaching "day zero" and then moves on to Day one, Day two, and so on. Coming right on top of *The Last Sunday of the Church Year*, and at the start of Advent, there seemed an interesting parallel. The church is doing its own "count-down" to the coming birth of our Lord, Savior and Bridegroom. He comes willingly, humbly, and tasked to redeem his people and, in time, his creation. Counting backwards to December 25 is easy, and many Advent calendars can help with the task. Counting down to the end of time, however, is not possible, though we know it is coming. We're told to be prepared.

"Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue... "

Traditional wedding preparations call for each of the above to be included as a bride prepares to meet her bridegroom – metaphorical language used in scripture for Christ's union with His church.

Music aids our preparations for the incarnation of Christ, speaking to both mind and spirit. If asked "what is your favorite Advent hymn or Christmas carol, and why?", what would you answer? For me, there are many "favorites", and choosing would be tough. If limited to only the music presently in rehearsal in Chancel Choir and SōLI, I doubt that I could even choose from those, but the scores are running through my head constantly.

The upcoming **SōLI** concert begins with Paul Manz' classic choral prayer, sung and loved world-wide for more than half of a century: *E'en so, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come*. It begins, "peace be to you and grace from him Who freed us from our sins, Who loved us all and shed his blood That we might saved be."

Eriks Ešenvalds' *Stars* stunned me when I first heard it at the American Choral Director's Association conference in Salt Lake City. The choir is accompanied by "singing" wine glasses and/or singing bowls, and yes, they need to be tuned by adjusting the amount of water in each glass. "Hearing" the northern lights comes to mind, or staring at the Milky Way from a dark place ... you decide!

SōLI is also performing Patrick Hawes' *The Nativity* - a set of six new carols with beautifully crafted texts written by Andrew Hawes, the composer's brother, that enable a fresh glimpse at various scenes surrounding the birth of Christ. Here are a few excerpts:

from *The Manger:* Come in,

Stoop down through This low door. Come: kneel upon this Earthen floor...

from *The Infant*: This Infant is enthroned in straw;

His palace is this stable floor; His head is crowned in lantern light, This *outhouse* is his heart's delight...

Rejoice! Rejoice! Rise up and dance! For all there is another chance To know the hope of sweetest love This Infant brings from God above! from The Oxen:

Our yoke hangs upon the stable wall; And winter's cold has laid our burden down. We slumber, eat, ignored by all Hidden here, the world goes by in sound.

Into our haven at this darkest time, A young girl with an old man found their way: Upon the straw the girl in trust lay down; The old man for the Lord's mercy prayed...

(Following the birth)
All was still until the maiden spoke;

"Dear Oxen, with your brown and shining eyes, So quiet, calm, so strong and yet so kind, Before all creatures you are the first to see The One who will bear our yoke eternally!"

Angels, We have heard on high, In Dulci Jubilo, He is born-the Divine Christ Child and more awaits your hearing at the Singers of Long Island's program: Sights, Sounds & Songs of the Nativity, Saturday, December 14 at 2 pm, with the concert followed by a festive reception - proceeds go to the Mainstreet Fire Relief Fund — and if it is a concern, you can be home before dark! Perhaps invite a friend along for an afternoon outing?

Christmas Eve, Chancel Choir joins with keyboard and bells in singing something especially "old" that is also new: Of the Father's Love begotten ere the world began to be" – a 13th c. chant with a text dating back to the 4th century is set in a lovely, recently published arrangement.

As for "something blue" – the music for this year's **Longest Night Service**, sometimes referred to as "Blue Christmas" on Saturday, December 21 at 7pm, is packed with words of hope.

"Come to me, you who are in need, and are heavy laden; come find comfort for your soul" (from Matt. 11:28, Bradley Ellingboe)

"Tell my heart that morning's nigh; Grace, like rain shall wash the sky" (from Come, Lord Jesus, Prince of Peace, with a text by Barbara Davis-Pyles)

And from a choir favorite:

There's no distance the Prince of Peace won't go, from manger low to Calvary's hill; when your pain runs deep, His love runs deeper still.

He has always loved you, child, and He always will.

...Emmanuel will meet you where you are. He knows your hurt, He knows your name And you're the very reason that He came.

Somewhere in your silent night (M. West, B. Herms and M. Hall):

There is a lot of "musak" and jingles trying to put us in the holiday spirit out there in the world (and every shop you enter). There is also enriching music helping to prepare us for the one coming to us right here at St. John's. Come listen and join in the singing, too! Invite a friend and neighbor to come along.
