#### As We Gather

Freedom in Christ is certainly one of the main themes of Reformation Day. Liberated from sin and death, Christ has set us on a path of freedom to live boldly under the Gospel. Martin Luther sought to bring this truth back into the light in his day so that all could live in the joy of sins forgiven, rather than under the fear and oppression of the Law. How that freedom is lived falls under the category of discipleship, and today, Jesus says that those who abide in the Word are his free disciples. Such is our call as his disciples today, to carry the banner of the truth of God's Word as we live in freedom from sin and death and in the constant hope of life eternal!

#### Today in the Church Year

While Reformation Day is oftentimes a look back to the early 1500's and the history of what happened surrounding the work of Martin Luther, it is really something much more. Luther's work was ancient, in the best sense of that term. His call for reform was to return to the Scriptures, to salvation by grace alone, through faith alone, and in Christ alone. This was a call to return to what Jesus said and did for the world, and for the Church to proclaim Christ and him crucified. So while we remember Martin Luther's life and writings, today is about Christ and his work for us. The color of the day is Red, like on Pentecost, to remind us of how the Holy Spirit's fire works in us through the Gospel to grant us faith, hope, and life eternal.



<sup>19</sup>Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. <sup>20</sup>For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

<sup>21</sup>But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—<sup>22</sup>the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. 



#### **Proclamation of Christ**


- As often as we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until He comes.



#### Distribution

Please read what Saint John's believes concerning the Sacrament of the Altar:

As Lutherans, we believe, teach, and confess that in the Holy Supper all receive the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ with their mouth. Believers feed on Christ for the assurance of salvation and the strengthening of their faith.

To assure that our Lord's great gifts are received in a beneficial way, Holy Scripture says in 1 Corinthians 11:28-29 "A man ought to examine himself before he eats of the bread and drinks of the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without recognizing the body of the Lord eats and drinks judgment on himself." Self examination includes:

1) The confession that we are sinful and in need of God's forgiveness. (Ps 51; Romans 3: 9-28)

2) The faith that Jesus Christ is truly and actually present in the Sacrament, offering His very Body and Blood for all to eat, so that our sins are forgiven. (Mt 26: 26-28; 1 Cor 10: 16-21)

3) The sincere resolve, with the Holy Spirit's help, to amend what is sinful in our life by actively belonging to a body of believers where these Scriptural truths are preached and taught. (Acts 2: 42; Ephesians 2: 8-10) If this reflects your belief and you are a member in good standing, not under discipline, at a congregation of The Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod or a church body with which we are in fellowship, we welcome you to the Lord's Table and pray that His Body and Blood will be for your soul the highest good. If you are not sure, or do not understand, we ask that you speak with the Pastor, at your earliest convenience, prior to communing. If you would like to come to the altar and receive a personal blessing instead of the Eucharist, please cross your arms over your chest as a sign to the pastor.

Distribution will take place around the altar. Both sides of the church will be ushered forward up the center aisle at the same time with the first person in line starting at the center, and the rest fanning out along the sides. Once everyone has come forward, you will be invited to kneel, if able, to receive the Sacrament. Once all have received, and the pastor announces the dismissal, you may stand and the two people in the middle will turn and start back to their seats, with both sides following and returning via the side aisles.

Lord God, we worship you, a Trinity of persons, one eternal God. May our faith and the sacrament we receive bring us health of mind and body. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.



#### Closing Voluntary: Toccata & Fugue in D minor BWV 565

J. S. Bach

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) was the foremost of Lutheran musicians in the Baroque Period. He served the court, schools, and particularly the Lutheran Church as a director, organist and composer, proclaiming Christ in and through his music for the glory of God. His iconic Toccata and Fugue in D minor contrasts a free-form, toccata with its sweeping runs, crashing chords and dramatic pauses with a highly structured, masterfully conceived fugue – where beauty, power and freedom are found within the "laws" of counterpoint - perhaps a small reflection in music of the freedom we have by God's grace, won for us by Christ's perfect keeping of the law and his sacrificial death for our sin.

(You are invited, and encouraged, to stay and listen to the voluntary as a way to continue to ponder God's love for you, and consider how today's message and music can influence your life over the coming week. This is also a nice way to calm yourself before heading out into the rest of the day's activities.)

Draw your church together, O God, into one great company of disciples, together following our teacher Jesus Christ into every walk of life, together serving in Christ's mission to the world, together witnessing to your love wherever you will send us; for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
